3.	Manager's Report	Diane Summers gave the Manager's Report. She announced that Orange County's COVID-19 hiring freeze has concluded and Animal Services will soon have multiple positions posting, as the shelter aims to return to full staffing.  Kitten season is in full swing and the need for volunteers and foster parents is increasing.  Katherine Martinez, Business Systems Analyst and former Training Coordinator and Animal Services Road Officer was introduced as a subject matter expert on shelter operations.	
4.	Old business	Nanette Parratto-Wagner announced that the Orange County Commissioners voted for a total ban on retail puppy and kitten sales in Orange County. This will go before a public hearing in late June and require a vote. If passed, current businesses will have one year to comply.	
5.	New Business	\$2,500 Grant was approved for the following:  • The Way Home	
6.	Public Comments	Citizen Karin Snitz questioned OCAS' euthanasia methods and procedures asking why intracardiac injection is used. She also requested that cameras be put in the euthanasia locations.	
		Parratto-Wagner spoke as a veterinarian that it is not always feasible to use an IV for multiple reasons and assured her that intracardiac injection is equally humane.	

	Katherine Martinez gave a brief overview of euthanasia methods reiterating that an anesthetic sedative is always given first.  Erika Higgins asked if the intracardiac method was less humane than the intravenous method.  Parratto-Wagner and Martinez assured her that it is not.
